DEMONSTRATION

Allan McNeel continued his discussion of marking and measuring. One of Allan's most often used measuring tools is his 6 inch rule. It has a satin finish and etched markings which make it easy to read and accurate when used to set up another tool such as a marking gauge. Another favorite set up tool is a magnetic angle finder. Used mostly for setting the angle on his table saw blade, there were many other uses discussed. Also discussed were the different ways to check a square to see if it is "square."



SAFETY NOTE

Power tools will frequently be used while working on club projects and during demonstrations at club meetings. For your protection, safety glasses with side shields, and hearing protection will be required for members to participate in these activities. No exceptions will be made. Please bring your own safety glasses and hearing protection. The club has **some** of these items, but we can not provide this equipment for everyone, all the time. ***You are responsible for your own safety!*** Note: Turning off hearing aids is not considered to be hearing protection.

SHOW AND TELL

Andy Sheetz showed a method of using peel and stick paper sheets to make scroll saw patterns. He prints the pattern on the peel and stick paper and applies it to the wood. It leaves a minimum amount of residue when peeled off.





Bob Shingleton made a pull toy cricket that is also a xylophone. The antennae come off and are the hammers. He also had a scroll sawn trivet.

Roy Reveal showed a couple of bowls made with a scroll saw. He cuts rings with his scroll saw at an angle and glues the rings together before turning.



Doug Kemp showed a square footed bowl made from one piece of wood. He also had a bowl made from Aspen wood.

Ed Connors showed another pyramid he made. He cut this one without any pith, hoping it wouldn't split. This one was cut at the same angle as the Great Pyramid at 51.2 degrees. He tilted the table on his bandsaw to 38.8 degrees.



Skip Cox showed a scroll sawn plaque of the Vietnam War Memorial. He also scroll sawed a plaque of a hawk and made an oval frame to put it in.
